Veterans Day 2021 at AFRH-G

On Saturday, November 6, AFRH-G residents were offered transportation and seating at the 21st Annual MS Coast Veterans Day Parade. To keep the Veterans Day celebration going, the Yankee Doodles Parading Group and the FRA Home Chapter of the Fleet Reserve Association had ceremonies and paraded through the AFRH-G on Thursday, November 11. AFRH veterans are very cognizant of military holidays and Veterans Day is one of the very special occasions.

The story of Veterans Day started with the signaling of the end of World War I, between the Allies and Germany, an armistice was set for the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, was considered the end of "the war to end all wars" and called Armistice Day.

In 1926, Congress recognized it as an official holiday, a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I. With the happenings of World War II and the Korean War, at the urging of veterans service organizations in 1954, Congress changed the word "armistice" to "veterans" so the day would honor American veterans of all wars. Veterans Day celebrates the service of ALL U.S. military veterans.

The Home's November 11 celebrations began at the flag post with the Pledge of Allegiance and a prayer. To uplift the viewing residents, the Yankee Doodles and FRA Members sang out with the WWI song, "Over There," before parading through the AFRH-G halls and waving American flags in honor of this patriotic day.



AFRH is not just a place to live but a place to live more. Our model retirement communities are designed for residents to maintain an independent lifestyle in an environment designed for safety, comfort and personal enrichment.

-Eligibility: Military veterans from each service branch can live at AFRH. The following persons who served as members of the Armed Forces, at least one-half of whose service was not commissioned service other than as a warrant officer or limited-duty officer, are eligible to become residents of the Retirement Home:

-Active-Duty Career Retired: Veterans who retired with 20 or more years of active-duty service in a regular component of the Armed Forces.
-Eligible for Retired Pay: Veterans, who served in a regular or reserve component of the Armed Forces, who are now eligible to receive retired pay and benefits:

- · Retired Guard/Reserves with over 20 years of creditable service (combined inactive and active-duty).
- · Veterans who qualified for an early retirement such as TERA (Temporary Early Retirement Authority).

· Veterans who were given a medical or disability retirement with pay and full benefits.

-Service-Connected Disability: Veterans with a service-connected disability rating of 50 percent or greater from the Dept. of Veterans Affairs.

-War Theater: Veterans who served in a war theater or received hostile fire pay and now suffer from injuries, disease, or disability.
-WWII Female Veteran: Veterans who served in a women's component before June 12, 1948 who are determined to be eligible due to compelling personal circumstances.
-Beneficiary Spouse: The spouse of a retired veteran may apply to live with the Retiree if he/she is enrolled as a beneficiary in DEERS (Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System) and was married to his/her sponsor prior to the veteran's retirement from the Armed Forces.

AFRH-W Resident Highlight – Robert Farris

Born on April 28, 1931 in Chicago, Robert Farris considers Alabama his home state. During that period in the United States, people had to travel wherever they could to find work, and Bob's father was no exception. William "Kay" Farris (from Alabama) and his wife Elizabeth (from Pittsburgh) traveled between Alabama and Chicago, where they had family, seeking employment! At one point, Bob's dad was the head meat carver for a Chicago restaurant! (He was the man in the white chef coat who would stand in the restaurant's window and 'finely' carve the meat to show off his skills to the public.)

Bob and his two older brothers, William "Bill" and George "Bud," were raised in Elba, AL. They lived there until Bob was a junior in high school and then moved to Montgomery, AL, where Bob graduated. He immediately joined the Navy, just like his brothers.

Basic training took place in San Diego, and then to San Francisco, where he boarded a ship for reassignment to Guam in November 1949. (In December of that year a typhoon hit Guam, what luck!) As it turned out, the motor pool was full, so they sent him to the carpenter shop, where he learned his job from a Guamanian carpenter. What Bob remembers from that tour was that everything seemed to be reversed! The deer were two-feet tall, the

lizards were five-feet long, and the fruit bats were huge!
In 1951, Bob reported to San Diego as a carpenter, where he commissioned the USS Frontier AD-25. This ship toured Japan for six months and then returned to Long Beach. That year, for the Christmas holidays, Bob visited a friend in Van Nuys, where he met his future wife, Betty, on New Year's Eve.
Then he returned to San Diego for his first discharge from the Navy. While out of the Navy, Bob traveled around the country from California to Chicago, New York, Alabama, and Pennsylvania to see Betty!!

When Bob rejoined the Navy, after 87 days, he was assigned to the carpenter shop on the USS Hornet CVA-12, in Brooklyn. On the Hornet, he proceeded to Gitmo for touch-and-go training, then to Bremerhaven, GE, and France for brief stays. He was ready to take his "first" around-the-world cruise, when his

previously applied for shore duty was approved. So, he and Betty married and lived in Annapolis, MD for two years. (Their marriage lasted 35 years and produced two beautiful children, Joanne and Robert!)

On his next assignment, on the West Coast, Bob commissioned the Thetis Bay CVHA-1, which was the first helicopter assault carrier. From there he attended electronic school in

San Francisco, which drew an appointment to Yorktown, VA, for four years at the Naval Mine Depot. There he loaded ships with missiles, restocked and refueled them!

Bob's next tour took him to Boston, MA, where he commissioned the USS Long Beach CGN-9 (the first nuclear-powered surface ship), which was waiting to take him on two

Mediterranean tours. On the day the Long Beach was prepared to leave with the fleet on the "second" around-the-world cruise, Bob was again transferred back to Yorktown, VA, promoted to chief (E-7), and stationed at the Naval Weapons

Station, for two to three years.

His final tour was aboard the missile cruiser USS
Columbus CG-12 on a cruise of the Mediterranean, and
then retired in Yorktown, as a chief after 19.6 years. As
a civilian, Bob spent 19.5 years in civil service, mostly at
the Defense General Supply Center in Virginia. One
highlight of Bob's life was a trip he took with his church

Bob then moved to Georgia, where he met his second wife, Carolyn. They were married for 25 wonderful years, until she passed away.

Aware of the two Armed Forces Retirement Homes, Bob visited both locations. He ended up in DC because (1) there is so much more to do and (2) his children live in Virginia. Bob is involved in numerous projects at AFRH-W. He loves making wooden toys from kits, working at the library, reading books, watching movies and playing pool.

Dr. Tim Williams was born in Knoxville, TN in 1962. He is the middle child of three brothers and three sisters. His two children were born while he was overseas, although they are both U. S. citizens (Tim would love for one of them to be President!).

When it came time to settle down from his busy life, he took the recommendation of a retired Marine and friend to apply to become a resident at AFRH-G. Eleven months later, in the midst of a pandemic, he was able to move in. Tim is one of the newer residents in the Home, so he is still learning the area. So far he enjoys the Home and spends his leisure time using the computer, watching TV, and reading.

They put out a call for nominations for excellence in various areas of service, including innovations in service delivery. Knowing that the AFRH-W Independent Living Recreation Team was using old resources in new ways, and knowing that we were stretching these resources further than other comparable retirement communities were in our region, a nomination was entered. While the team, consisting of Linda Bailey, Team Lead, Marla McGuinness, Programmer, Marine Robbins, Volunteer Coordinator, and Chris Baldwin, Librarian, did not win the top prize, we did get recognized with an Honorable Mention in the category of Innovations.

The entry spoke about the use of the in-house TV system to show videos created right at AFRH-W, including both staff and residents. These provided a replacement for the special events in the calendar that we could not come together to celebrate in the past year. Also mentioned were Social Distance Bingo, Thirsty Thursday, Popcorn Mondays and the Cleaning Crew, among other activities. Congratulations to our team, and their recognition for a job innovatively and well done under trying circumstances.




Annual Creative Arts Festival



Our campus also is showing off, as it always does this time of year, with all the vivid colors as the leaves start turning (photos below). Happy holidays everyone!










The military life of Rodney Downs Tyrone

Rodney Downs Tyrone was born on June 24, 1947 to Maxine and Sgt. Thad Tyrone, Sr. at Maxwell AFB, AL. He and his older brother, Thad, Jr., were brought up as normal military children who followed parents through a series of Air Force bases.

Rodney matriculated through his elementary schooling at a series of locations that included Port Huyeneme, a one-room school house at Mt. Laguna, CA, and finally at Kisarazu Air Force Base, Japan.

Following his high school graduation at Wetumpka, AL in 1965, Rodney enlisted in the Air Force for a four-year term and was sent to Lackland AFB, San Antonio, TX for basic training.

Having had exposure to his dad's and older brother's experiences, Rodney chose administrative duties for his career endeavor, which made him eligible to worldwide travel.

His first assignments were at Hunter AFB Savannah, GA and Charleston AFB, SC as an administration clerk and ended his first tour in Thailand at (NKP) Nakhon Phanom. "The City of Hills" was affectionately known as "Naked Fanny" or NKP by the Americans and referred to as the "End of the line at the edge of the world." As Rodney reminisced, he stated, "I separated for a year until my beer money ran out!"

Then, wearing buck sergeant stripes, he reenlisted for four years and was given a month's pay advance and a 30-day leave before being sent to March Air Force Base in Riverside, CA with duties as an office administrator.

He was then transferred to Osan Air Base, Korea for one year which was followed by a tour of Torrejón Air Base near Madrid, Spain.
In 1969, Rodney was promoted to staff sergeant before being sent to Hurlburt Field, FL, then to Craig AFB at Selma, AL, and later to West Ruislip AB England with duties at London's Heathrow Airport Postal Office.

After another year's separation, he reenlisted, and was stationed at Keesler AFB, MS as chief clerk for the Communications Center Squadron. He was then sent to March Air Force Base in Riverside, CA. In 1987 he was discharged while at Maxwell AFB, AL while serving with the headquarters unit.

Following his retirement, Rodney settled in his hometown and purchased a house. Following the death of his father, and being unmarried, he moved his mother into his home until she passed away. He then moved to AFRH-Washington for eight months and in June 2017, Rodney moved to AFRH-Gulfport and is living very happily!

Pauline was up at 0100 to see the eclipse. She patiently waited for the next three hours to capture these photos. Thank you Pauline for sharing your talent with us!










Notes from the AFRH-G resident advisory committee chairman

Wow, after many months of COVID related restrictions on where we could go and what we could do as a group, some of our residents finally got to do what they have been dreaming of: to go fishing.



With World Alzheimer Day on September 21st, Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month & the Walk to End Alzheimer's in November, AFRH-G has always focused on October, the month in between September and November to show out in purple! Did you know that roughly 50 million people worldwide live with Alzheimer's disease and other types of dementia? Recognized by President Ronald Reagan due to the need for heightened awareness, Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month was designated back in 1983. Alzheimer's disease is the most common form of dementia. It is a progressive neurodegenerative disease which often gets worse over time, causes symptoms of memory loss and cognitive decline, and eventually affects a person's ability to accomplish daily tasks. Some activities of daily living that may become a struggle include taking medications, using the phone, managing finances, housekeeping, shopping, and getting meals. Keep in mind that Alzheimer's disease is not a normal part of aging however, there has been promising research, along with medications that assist in slowing memory loss and improving the function of nerve cells in the brain. Structured environments with limited stress focused on a healthy diet, sleep and nutrition are helpful along with leisure interests that promote social interaction and an active mind. Exercise, gardening, music, dancing, drumming, painting, pottery, creative art, essential oils, games, pets, Skype or Facetime calls to loved ones, patio, newspaper, reading, word or number puzzles, jigsaw puzzles are just a few of Loyalty Hall's favorites that engage the brain, as well as improve the quality of life for our treasured veterans. As quoted by Carey Mulligan, "Those with dementia are still people and they still have character and they are all individuals and they are all unique.
