Driving Safety—Foggy Conditions

Safety Office reminds you that when you are behind the wheel few conditions are more treacherous than driving during foggy conditions.

4 Tips for Driving in Fog

① Keep safe distance. Dense fog limits visibility, leaving only seconds to react to hazards.



② Always use low-beams. Never use your high-beam lights as they causes glare, making it more difficult for you to see. Keep headlights on even after sunrise so others can see you!

Vehicle Safety & Situational Awareness



- High Beams (X)
- Low Beams (✓)
- Fog Lights (✓)

Be familiar with your low and high beam settings specific to your vehicle. Do NOT use high beams

Keep headlights on, even after sunrise so the cars behind you can see your tail lights

Be alert for other drivers who may have forgotten to turn on their lights

③ Allow extra time for travel. Traffic may likely be slower moving during foggy conditions. Also, avoid passing other vehicles.

Road Safety & Preparations



Plan accordingly. Allow extra time to get to your destination

Follow lines in the road and use road reflectors as a guide to determine how the road may curve ahead of you

Avoid passing other vehicles

④ Use caution when crossing bridges. Visibility is usually the lowest across bridges & goodies of water. Be aware of rapidly changing conditions.

Being Extra Cautions across Bridges



Visibility is usually the lowest on bridges and bodies of water.

Avoid pulling over unless absolutely necessary. If you do, turn off all lights except hazard flashing lights

During sunrise, sunlight could make visibility much less due to the fog reflecting light!
